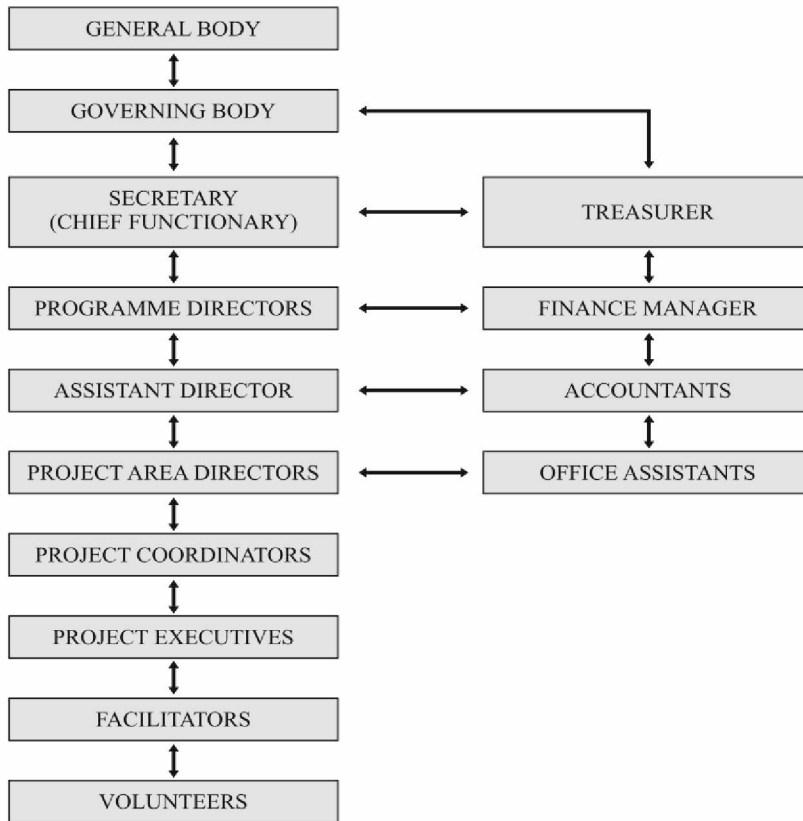

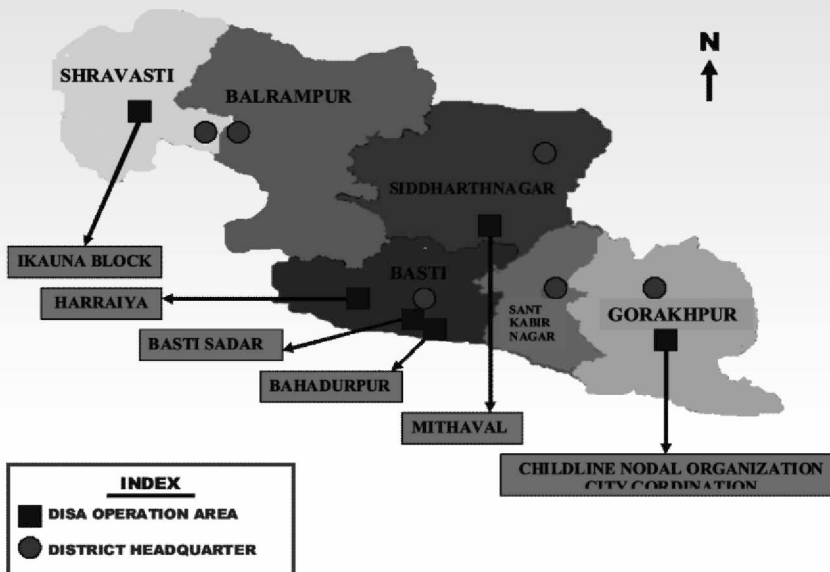

Development Interventions and Accomplishments

1. Financial Inclusion and Livelihood Program :

The availability of financial facilities that meet the specific needs of SHG members without discrimination is a key objective of financial inclusion in the Group. It is widely believed that financial inclusion aids inclusive growth, economic development, and financial deepening.

DISA has taken the keen interest in and has facilitated and mentored the Self-help Groups in the villages for the financial inclusion economic empowerment in eight Blocks. These SHGs have their regular monthly meetings, regular savings, inter-loaning and income generating activities, under the guidance of the staff of DISA. The leaders of these groups shoulder responsibilities for the above mentioned activities. The work and progress in a nutshell is given as follows. The attendance of meetings is 95%. Out of 211 groups, 125 groups are able to conduct the meetings by themselves without the help of facilitators. 80 groups maintains their records by themselves. 230 new members were learnt to write their own names and put sign. 81 groups increased their monthly savings from Rs. 30 to Rs. 50 or 60 or 70 or even up to 100 and 150. 13 Groups have decided to use Cheques for transactions. 6 groups have started extra saving. Trainings were provided for the leaders of SHGs and facilitators on different topics such as Leadership and Micro Planning etc...

CASE STUDIES

Elevated and motivated for a better living

Women are the nucleus of our civilization. They have different roles to play in the ever changing social set-up. Women's development is directly related with the nation development. With the dawn of independence our constitution guaranteed gender equality and a large number of schemes and programs have been initiated for women's development. Micro-financing to SHGs create lot of avenues for the empowerment and in promoting well-being for women proper funding and timely financial aid can bring even the poor people to the main stream of society. However, usually nobody helps them and if helped, would find it as an opportunity to take away what they already have in the name of huge interest. Here is the example of how Self Help Groups help such helpless women.

Success of one group forms seven groups

Majja is a village in Kaphtangunj block of Basti District. The main occupation of the people here are agricultural farming and daily wages labour. Taking the afflictions of the people into consideration, DISA started to work towards the development of the people in the region by forming Self Help Group (SHG) named 'Ambedkar Self Help Group'



In the beginning twelve women joined the group. They deposited thirty to fifty rupees per month as their saving. With the efforts of DISA these women joined the National Rural Livelihood Mission. This group had got Rs. 15000 in the form of revolving fund from the block and a loan of Rs. 50,000, CCL from State Bank of India.

The husband of Sumitra Devi, one of the members of this Self-Help Group, is a carpenter who is skilled in making furniture. Due to poor financial condition he was not able to open a shop and do the business. In the SHG meeting Sumitra Devi made a proposal to grant her a loan from the group so that she can open a furniture shop. The members agreed and on fulfilling the legal formalities, a loan of 30,000 rupees was granted her.

Her husband opened the shop. Being a good craftsman and having acquaintance in the nearby villages, his shop made a good business. Three men who got employment in the furniture shop are also happy. Sumitra Devi started repaying the loan as per the rules and regulations of the society. Having influenced by the efforts of Sumitra Devi the women of poor families came forward and opened nine more self-help groups.

The members of these groups are planning to do something that can improve their income and lead a better life. They want to make this village Majja a model village that has all the facilities announced by the state and union government. Some of them also want to contest the panchayat elections with the support of the group to fulfill the dreams.

Right direction empowered the young girl.

There are thousands of villages in rural India. The population there, especially the young girls and boys are the victims of financial insecurities that shatter their dreams. Most people depend on daily wages and there are days they are not able to earn anything for livelihood. Most of the youngsters in these villages are illiterate too.

Somarpure Prasad is one such small settlement in Rajasw village in Bahawalpur block of Basti district. The major population of this area is backward and scheduled caste. Being illiterate they were poor at communication and they lived a desperate life.

With due efforts the organization DISA was able to form Saloni Sangm that works for the better living and well-being of young girls. 18 young girls are the active members of Saloni Sangm. Renu is one of the members of the group. She is the daughter of Ram Karan who has three daughters and two sons. Due to poor financial conditions she was not able to pursue her education beyond matriculation. She was mainly engaged in household chores. One of the meetings of Saloni Sangm discussed skill development such as tailoring. Renu was influenced by this idea and she joined the training center that gave training in tailoring. She did a six month course that enabled her to do small work. Slowly she became good in tailoring skill and at present she is earning not less than four hundred rupees a day- an amount that is much helpful to a village girl. She is helping her parents financially with her income. Besides with the help of this income she is planning to pursue her discontinued studies. Renu has become an inspiration to many young girls who want to develop vocational skills like tailoring. Moreover, she is now able to help many girls who want to learn tailoring.

2. Gender Justice and Women Empowerment

In India women make up nearly half the population of any country, so their exclusion from the top table, only ends up accentuating further inequality. India has achieved a lot of the goals to ensure gender justice. Much progress has been made. Yet, a lot still remains to be done. For women empowerment education is the best weapon for fighting against injustice. Illiteracy is the root of all exploitation, violence and oppression. Our government not only make laws for women and try to implement it but also take the care that each and every women in our society should be educated. Legal awareness to women rights is also necessary and most important thing is that women should take care of their rights.

DISA joins hands with Nai Disha Mahila Samiti, a registered society in promoting Gender Justice and Women Empowerment issues.





There are 105 Village Level Associations with 1859 members and 195 Gram Panchayat Level Committees having 1402 members. Representatives are elected to form 3 Block Level Women Committees at Basti Sadar, Harraiya, Ikauna and Mithawal Blocks with 865 leaders and they are federated at Central Level to form the Nai DISHA Mahila Samiti. The Block Level and Central Level Committees have quarterly review and planning meetings whereas the Gram Panchayat Level Committees meet once in two months. Village level Associations have their meetings every month for review and planning for social actions for rights and entitlements. Gram Panchayat level Associations function as broad Community Based Organizations (CBOs). Various collective actions were taken by women to highlight their demands for justice, equity and access to resources. They had many awareness rallies, public meetings, wall writings, common celebrations and cultural programs. They celebrated International Women's Day at 4 Blocks at Basti Sadar, Harraiya, Mithawal and Sharawasti. All together 3800 Women participated in this great event. On the day they focused on the themes "women and environment". Everyone was made aware that how to care for the environment and protect the mother earth. Women become the prey for violence and ill-treatment in spite of their prim and important place in the family. As a mother to the family Environment to the earth. All renewed their knowledge and promised to protect the mother earth. Poems, dances, skits, awareness songs, action songs were conducted on the theme. Women participated in the various cultural activities. The representatives of the Farmers Club, SHG Group, Saloni Sangm and differently able children shared about their experiences with the DISA organization.

CASE STUDIES

The Efforts of Women Found Success

In the socio-political scenario of rural India decisions are taken by men and the demands of women are neglected or not fully considered. But if women are guided properly under an able leadership, they get strength and men cannot ignore their demands. Here is a true success of that effort.

DISA has been working for the improvement of women in Ramya village for ten years. Throughout this time the women have been appealing to the village Pradhan to allocate a plot for building Ambedkar Park. Despite repeated assurance from the Pradhan, the land was not given. Although two elections were held after every five year, the demand of the women of Nai Disha Mahila Samiti remained unfulfilled.

Though Pradhan proposed to give a vacant land, some influential persons of the village opposed the move. In October 2017 with the effort of a DISA Facilitator, Laluram and a few women of the village, a new group which included educated women was formed. In course of time the group was strengthened with the inclusion of wife of Pradhan.

In the month of January, the organisation planned Republic Day celebrations and the village Panchayat was informed about flag hoisting. Pradhan hoisted the flag and the village representative made a speech narrating the efforts of Bhimrao Ambedkar in formulating the constitution of India and making it a sovereign republic.



Nai DISA Mahila Samiti convened a meeting on 18th February. The meeting discussed the issues regarding Ambedkar Park and also the celebration of International Women's day. It was decided that the women's Day was to be celebrated on 11th March in Basti and the women demanded the Pradhan to arrange conveyance facility to go there. The panchayat president agreed to send two buses to carry the women and also agreed to give some amount for refreshment. When they came to Basti, they came in contact with other groups from different blocks and came to know about their activities.

Again the meeting of Nai Disa Mahila Samiti was held on 23rd March. During the meeting the members discussed issue of Ambedkar Park again and decided to approach the Pradhan. Eighteen women went to the house of Pradhan and talked about the allocation of land. Pradhan agreed to hold a meeting to take a decision on the issue. In a meeting held on 25th march, it was decided to build Ambedkar Park in vacant plot in Harijan, Basti.

Soon after the decision was taken, the members came together to clean the land in the leadership of Mrs. Reeta Devi, Sangeeta Devi, Anjani Devi and Meera Devi. They collected a fund and on 14th April with a financial support of Pradhan, a stage was built there in the park. On the same day idols of Ambedkar and Goutam Budhha worth 17,000 rupees were installed. The block head of Harraiya, Mr. Yogendra Pratap Singh installed the idols. The people of the village as well as the members of Nai DISHA Mahila Samiti were much happy about the work done. They do give constant awareness to the people regarding their own rights.



3. Anganvadi Centre built with the effort of Nai DISHA MahilaSamiti.

There are five villages in the gram of Basti Sadar Block in Basti district. Majority of the people in these villages belong to Scheduled caste. The main occupation of the people is farming and daily wages work. Being illiterate they are not able to express their demands and they remain ignored, poor and marginalized.

In the year 2015 with the efforts of DISA, Nai Disha Mahila Samiti was constituted in the village Ramvapaur to empower the women and make them aware of different issues; meetings were held on a regular basis. Seeing the good result and changes in the life of women of this village, a branch of the same organisation was formed in the village Bhausimpur. The women of three villages joined this to form a Panchayat level group.

In one of the meetings, a member Mrs. Kamala Devi raised the issue of starting Anganvadi Centre



in the village to teach the small children who are illiterate. It was decided in the meeting that the women altogether will raise this issue in the general meeting of the Panchayat.

During the general meeting, the issue was raised and the questions came about the place where it can be built. There was bencher land belonged to the Gram Panchayat but it was occupied by the members of the forward community. The people of forward community were not in favour of Anganvadi centre and they opposed the proposal as their children had other means to learn.

But the women protested together and the panchayat secretary was forced to relent. Seeing the strength of women protest, later it was agreed to build Anganvadi centre on a consensus in the proposed land. The proceedings went fast and the building was ready in six months. At present the small children of many villages are coming to this Anganvadi Centre and learn. Now the women are on their effort to make it a model Anganvadi.

The efforts of Nai Disha Mahila Samiti are being concentrated on bringing more developments in other fields as well. Women are made aware on the field of health and cleanliness and slowly the changes are seen.

4. Sustainable Agriculture and Natural Resource Management

The most disorganised and ignored section in our country are the farmer who produce food items for the entire folk. Even though modern techniques and innovations on new methods of farming are





available, they do not reach to the small land owners who live in the rural areas. Kisan Club is an initiative to enable the farmers avail the new methods and make farming as profitable as possible.

Sustainable Agriculture and Natural Resource Management activities seek to increase agricultural productivity through adoption of practices that maintain the long term ecological and biological integrity of natural resources. The goal is to provide better economic returns to individuals and contribute to the quality of life and economic development in the rural area.

Promotion of best agricultural practices for better and more profitable land use, increasing the livelihood and income sources and protection of natural resources have been the focus of DISA. We are mainly focusing to meet these challenges through the Farmers' Clubs and Common Facility Centers. Village level group meetings are conducted on regular monthly basis to disseminate the ideas of best agricultural practices and technical support.

CASE STUDY

With the Aid of Government Scheme Farmer Became Happy

Gauria is a village in the Bahadarpur block of Basti district. Most of the residents of this village are dalits and backward communities whose main occupations are agriculture, cattle rearing and daily wages labour. They never get enough income to lead a prosperous life or provide good education to the children. They do not get proper income from their farming as they follow traditional method of farming that never gives a good harvest.



Taking the afflictions of the people into consideration, DISA started working towards the development of the people in the region formed a club named 'Harit Kranti'. In a meeting of this club farmers were explained the new techniques of farming. One of the farmers, Asaram, inspired by the discussions, desired to buy Rotavator. Kissan club helped him to make use of the government schemes and apply for it with proper documents. The total cost of the rotavator was Rs. 1,05,000 (one lakh five thousand). He got Rs. 35,000 (thirty five thousand as government subsidy). With the help of this rotavator, he is able to plough the agricultural field and get a better profit now a days. Besides ploughing his field, he is helping other farmers too. In this way he has improved the income of his family and is leading a good life. He is now capable of giving good education to the children with the better income.

Asaram has now more plans in his mind. He is planning to make use of profit he got from the better harvest to improve his farming by buying more machines like seed drill machine. Using more techniques, he believes that he will be able to improve his farming and improve the income.

5. Community Based Rehabilitation and Empowerment of PwDs

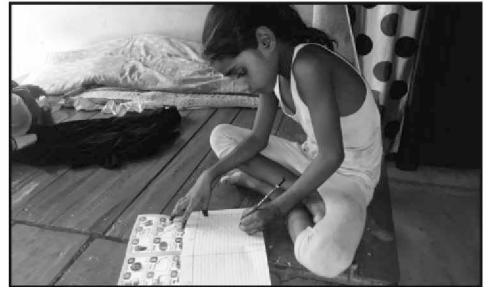
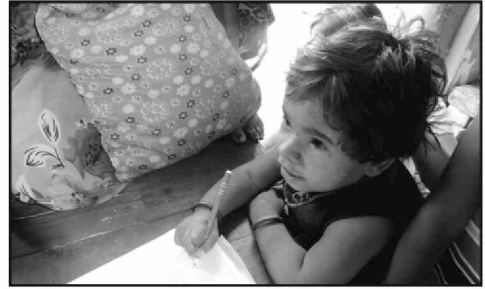
Community-based rehabilitation (CBR) was initiated by WHO following the declaration of Alma-Ata in 1978 in an effort to enhance the quality of life for people with disabilities and their families; meet their basic needs; and ensure their inclusion and participation. CBR is implemented through the combined efforts of people with disabilities, their families and communities, and relevant government and non-government health, education, vocational, social, empowerment and other services.

DISA's efforts to reach out to the most vulnerable and excluded section in the society have resulted in focusing on children and People with Disabilities (PwDs) for their rehabilitation and

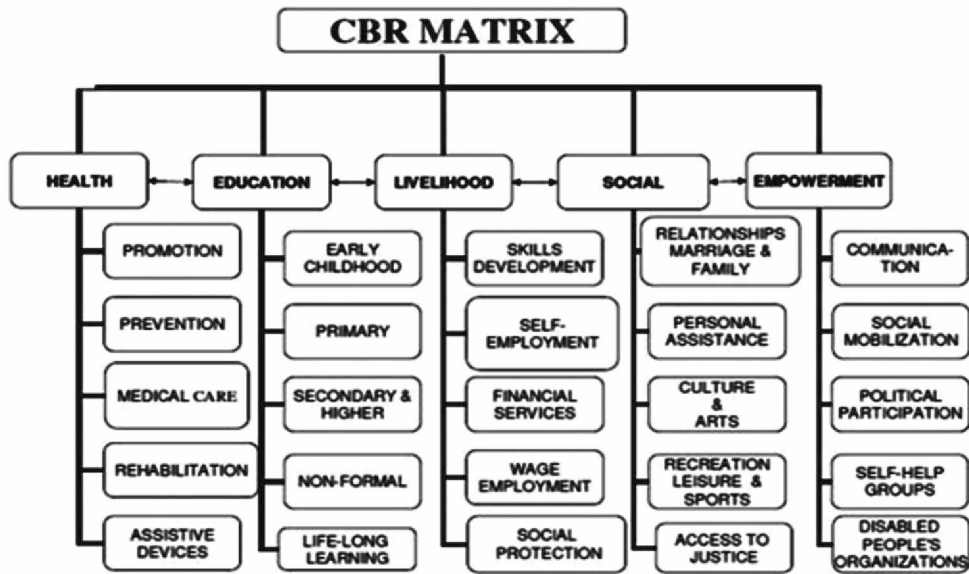




empowerment following the CBR Matrix. 82 Children have been directly assisted for their, social, educational and medical fitness. The annual gathering of these children along with their guardians was conducted on 21st June 2019 at Harraiya and on 23rd June at Kalwari and 48 children got special prizes in the various competitions conducted. 67 children participated in the gathering in Gorakhpur on the World Disability Day (UDAAN XIV) organized by PGSS and Diocese of Gorakhpur. We initiated our efforts to form Disabled Persons Organizations (DPOs) to demand and get the due rights of the PWDs. We organized awareness programs through Puppetry and trainings in view of forming DPOs and Inclusive SHGs.

6. Skill Development For Youth

DISA is conducting the skill development program (Tailoring) in four centres, Harriya, Faizabad, Shravasti and Basti with the support of Little Flower Society, Germany through CST Fathers. The main aim of this trade is to provide vocational training to candidates and turn them into skilled professionals who can work with garment (measure, cut, sew, operate relevant machinery and stitch) and make different types of dresses. All these centres are run by the support of our institutions in different places.

The short-term training imparted at DISA Training Centres (TCs) is expected to benefit candidates of rural girls/women who are either school/college dropouts or unemployed. And many of the candidates are from the Kishori groups (adolescent girls group) run by DISA in the villages. Apart from providing training DISA also impart training in health, education, awareness on different types of sickness and training to increase their leadership qualities. Duration of the training varies per centres and their need, ranging between 60 days to 90 days. This year we have given training to 210 girls in 3 different centers. Upon successful completion of their assessment, candidates shall be provided with certificates and placement assistance by DISA. Many of the candidates who have completed the training started to earn their livelihood at their home and village.





Partnership Programms

1. ECO-DRR Program (Eco System Based Disaster Risk Reduction)

ECO – DRR Project is being implemented in 12 Villages Block of Ikauna Block, Shravasti District from September 2015. Approximately 7.34 million hectares of area get affected annually due to Floods. Annual approximate loss due to floods is Rs. 432 corers. The important area of concern in the district Shravasti is that it is badly affected by frequent floods every year. The water from the River Rapti in the rainy season submerge many of villages and destroy households, crops, roads, trees, electric poles and many other public infrastructures.

The main goal of this Project is to restore the Eco-System by adopting Eco-based Disaster Risk Reduction and Climate Sensitive Practices with focus on community institutions, resilience building, networking and convergence for their Rights and Entitlements with the support and guidance of CARITAS India, New Delhi. The Village level Disaster Management Committee (VDMC) is formed in each village and it is responsible for initiating disaster preparedness activities. It consists of local elected representatives, grass root level government functionaries, local Non-Government Organisation (NGOs)/Community Based Organizations (CBOs), members of youth groups. The existing committee can be strengthen, capacities on disaster issues and building resilient. This program is successfully completed in August 2018.



2. JVS/CBR PROGRAM

DISA is involved in the rehabilitation of 82 Differently Abled children by adopting them for integrated development for which Stitching Lilliane Foundation has extended support through Jan Vikas Samiti, (JVS) Varanasi. We follow the principles and practices of Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) model.

The children adopted are given medical, educational, social and emotional support to cope with their disabilities and integrate themselves in the mainstream of the society. 13 children are in St. Francis School for Hearing impaired,



Takurganj, and Lucknow and 4 Children in Nav Jyoti School for Visually Impaired, Mohanlalganj, Lucknow. Together with Lilliane Foundation we also try to contribute to a world that is open for everyone, and in which children and youngsters with disabilities who live in poverty can develop and use their talents.



CASE STUDY

Anish is 11 years old with the locomotor disability hails from Kalwari, Basti and belongs to Schedule caste community. His father is an agriculture laborer and mother is a house wife. He is the youngest in the family and he has two elder sisters. They all go to school. Anish is studying in class 6th in a Government school in the village. Earlier Anish's parents were not given any importance for his education because of the lack of no special schools available in their location. The staff from DISA visited his family and met his parents and gave regular counseling to the child and his parents about the education of Anish, the importance of education and his rights to education. Later his parents were ready to send him to govt. School. JVS supported in his Study from 4 class onwards in Gov. School Kalwari. At Present he is studying in 6th class. With the help of DISA staff his parents managed to get him the Disability certificate. Anish and his parents are very happy and grateful by seeing his progress. The parents take care of the basic needs of the child. The parent and Anish participated in all the meeting and activities conducted by DISA. They are very grateful to Lilliane Fonds and Jan Vikas Samati for the positive interventions and his study.



“Forget your Disabilities, and explore your abilities”

Suhani comes from Harraiya block her family belongs to the Schedule class. She is ten years old with the disability of Cerebral Palsy.

From 2017 she has joined in the JVS Programme then she was 8 years old. We had taken her to RD Medical College Gorakhpur for health check-up. She was given medical help to make her muscles strong. Also given wheel chair in 2018. for her easy movements. She was given physiotherapy as it was prescribed by doctor. Before the physiotherapy she was not able to sit, stand, or move but now she is able to walk by herself without any support. From the JVS program she also was given the nutrition every month. Regular home based rehabilitation and education is given by the JVS/ DISA facilitator to prepare her to come to the main streams of the society and enjoy a dignified life. Her parents were motivated about how to behave with her and support her to help herself. They too were



taught how to do Physiotherapy to her 15 minutes daily. After lot of effort made by the staff as well as the parent the physical condition of Suhani has become much better

There is a vast change that we see in Suhani. Before the intervention she was not able to do anything properly. But now she is able to sit and stand by herself, she moves around slowly. Also, she has learned by herself. She recognizes the people around and makes good relationship with them. Her parents come occasionally to DISA for the meetings & other programs. The facilitator believes that through the continuous effort she can grow in her ADL activities and education. The parents are very much indebted to the JVS program and appreciate for all the help she has received.

3. CBR PROGRAM

CBR Programme was initiated in the Sahajanwa Block of Gorakhpur with the support of CBR Forum Bangalore in 2016. DISA has identified 443 differently able people in 35 villages of Shajanwa Block in the initial phase and in now we are taking them to the main stream through the formation of Village DPOs, Block DPOs and District DPOs focusing the CBR Matrix. The fourth year of the community-based rehabilitation (CBR) has taken its role to help people with disabilities, by establishing community-based medical integration, equalization of opportunities, and Physiotherapy rehabilitation programs for the disabled. Home based rehabilitation as well as education is conducted regularly to the individuals. Most of the clients have learnt to do their ADL. 60 clients received their Disability certificate. 5 PWDs received their training on the computer. 7 PwDs received the pension.

Case Study 1

14 year old Madhu hails from Maktapar Village, Shajanwa, Gorakhpur and having the disability with 75 percentages. She lives with her parents.

Along with her disability she suffers from thyroid. Since economic condition her family is very poor, she couldn't take the regular medicine. CBR workers motivated them to take medicine regularly. Her Physical growth is very less according to her age. After the intervention by CBRW she is completely involving in daily activities. She studies in class fifth and gradual improvement is visible in her studies. She has learnt how to keep herself, the surroundings clean and neat and to wash vessels. She involves herself to help in house hold activities. She takes interest to move around in the house and to make company with others. After the intervention there is a vast change that we could see in her.



Women's day Celebration :

We have organized first time the International Women's Day in 4 clusters of Sahjanwa Block for creating awareness in the communities and PwDs with regard to the needs, rights and potentials of PwDs and women. 367 PwDs, their parents and community members participated in this program. Various cultural programs were conducted for the PwDs and Community members to awaken their own responsibilities to become aware about their own rights, and the importance of education. Puppet show was there by CBR team on the current issues like importance of





cleanliness, Education, and environment during these programs. The Panchayat Members, Fr. Benny Paul, Program Director, Sr. Shiji, school staff and ASHAs, ANMs and Anganwadi workers and people of the locality were present in a large number to participate in these events. Women had very creatively prepared the programs in order to give awareness on the importance of “women and environment.”

4. Childline City Coordination

CHILDLINE 1098 is a service of Ministry of Women and Child Development. Childline India foundation is a non-government organisation (NGO) in India that operates a telephone helpline called Childline, for children in distress. It was India's first 24-hour, toll free, phone outreach service for children. Childline 1098 service is available all over India. It is available in 543+ districts and 117+ railway stations have Child Help Desks. CHILDLINE stands for a friendly 'didi' or a sympathetic 'bhaiya' who is always there for vulnerable children 24 hours of the day, 365 days of the year.

DISA is the Nodal Organization of CHILDLINE, Gorakhpur since January 2006. We join with PGSS, Gorakhpur, the Collaborative Organization to manage the city coordination for the rescue, rehabilitation and other operational aspects of CHILDLINE program.

Common Celebrations

DISA also celebrates the following common National and International Days with the CBOs and community members.

1. School Chalo Abhiyan (Go To School Campaign)

Literacy rate in rural India was especially in north India is pathetically poor. Neither the children nor the parents are well aware of the importance of education. Poverty of the parents is a major threat to the child education. To make changes the rural masses must be well aware of the government programs and facilities under national literacy mission and right to education provided.

DISA conducts seminar on this throughout the month of April and July. Various programs under national literacy mission were discussed and people were made aware during the meetings and seminars in Basti, Harraiya, Bahdurpur Blocks, Mithwal block of Siddharthnagar District and Ikauna Block in Sharavasti Considering the need of the society, the awareness campaigns were conducted, titled 'Go to School' under the guidance of DISA. All together 994 children and facilitators of DISA also participated in the rally and the meetings. The rally was flagged off by the teachers and the distinguished guests. Children carrying placards and raising slogans toured the entire village along the main road. They raised slogans

“Don't ask children to take tool, instead send them to school”. “Educate a girl child, she will be nation's pride” “Go to school today itself, register our names.” “We will go to school, we will get midday meal.”



2. World Health Day

DISA observed world Health Day on 7th April. Awareness on health issues and health hazards is very important in maintaining good health. The mass population living in our rural areas are ignorant of issues related health. When they encounter such issues, that drain them off their hard-earned saving of several years.





Keeping this as vital point in mind, DISA conducts seminars throughout the month of April to build awareness among the rural population. Awareness seminars and rallies were arranged in BastiSadar, Harraiya, Mithawal and Siddharthnagar on this occasion. The women volunteers associated with Self Help Groups and girls associated with SaloniSangam actively participate in the seminars and rallies.

3. World Women's Health Day

There reports lot of health issues which affect women and teenage girls. Women living in rural areas are vulnerable to many diseases. Awareness about such diseases and familiarity of its prevention can aid our women folk to a large extend. Moreover, women, being the caretaker of other members in the family, can do a lot fot the family health.

On 23rd May 2019 The Women's Health Day was celebrated in the village Soma Pure Prasad of Basti District. The celebration was conducted by the block program managers Mr. Devanand Pathak where Mrs. Sunita, members of Nai Disha Mahila Samiti, young girls, BCPM Mr. Shiv Bhushan, Mr. Rajendra the DISA block coordinator, DISA volunteers Rekha and Sudama and other sixty-three were congregated. In the same way well attended meetings were held in Mithawal, Dudhuva and Guhawra on 28th and 30th May respectively. In Harraiya, the information was conveyed through 38 Mahila Mandal which have strength of 428 members.



4. World Breast Feeding Week

Many of our women folk are unaware of childcare and their protection. The role of breast feeding is inevitable to bring up new healthy life and to guard it from diseases. The mothers of today and tomorrow should know about it and must be aware of its benefits. Being oriented towards it, various seminars and rallies were organized in Basti Sadar, Harraiya, Mithawal and Ikauna Blocks. Discussions were held among other groups to make them aware of the importance of breast feeding.

During the seminar the coordinator and animators explained women about the importance of breast feeding which can make the child immune towards even developing cholera and respiratory diseases.



Apart from this a quiz program on breast feeding was also conducted. The meeting was noted with the presence of 15 pregnant women, 15 midwives besides 202 other participants.

5. Safe Motherhood Day

Childbirth related problems and infant mortality are at a high rate in the rural India. Majority of these problems occur due to ignorance and non-availability of medical attention. Now, Government as well as many organizations are taking creative steps to bring down infant mortality rate and to keep woman safe and healthy during pregnancy.

Safe Motherhood Day is celebrated in the month of April. But the organization DISA conducts seminars and awareness program throughout the month in Basti, Harraiya, Mithawal, Ikauna and Shajanwa Blocks. Women of the Self Help Group, members of Saloni Sangam along with adolescent women organized seminar on Safe Motherhood Day in different days in which 1522 members participated.



6. World Environment Day

Misbalance of our environment gives rise to numerous hazards including climatic changes to our globe. It has already taken the form of a grave threat to the existence of life on earth. If we are not careful, it can take a fatal design and can put to risk the generations to come. It is our duty and responsibility to make people aware of these problems and take serious measures to protect our environment.

Seminars were held in Basti Sadar, Mithawal, Ikauna and Harraiya blocks on this issue in the month of June. And meetings were held in all other communities to aware the villagers about the environment and its protection.





7. Independence Day

Every year on 15 August, the streets of India are adorned with the tri colours of the national flag as the country celebrates its day of independence. DISA also celebrated the 73rd Independence Day in all its groups. Flag hoisting, cultural programs were conducted in all DISA villages of Basti Sadar, Harriya, Mithawal and Ikauna. Women and village Pradhans contributed to make the day a colorful one... During the meetings awareness were given to the group members about the freedom struggle and honored the freedom fighters.



8. Newborn Week

DISA arranged an awareness program in association with the 'Newborn week' throughout November. Rallies and seminars were conducted as its part in Basti Sadar, Harraiya, Ikauna, Sahajanwa and Mithawal blocks. Adolescent girls and women turned out in large numbers for the program. The block coordinator and facilitator explained in detail about the importance of giving special care to the newborn.



The placenta must be severed with a new blade and thread that was kept in boiling water must be used to tie the placenta. The rate of infant mortality has surely come down. Still, we are facing problems. Any sign of danger like yellow color on palms, cold and stiff body, absence of defecation and urination for 48 hours must be brought to the attention of the doctor.



9. Girl Child Day

DISA organized a Girl Child Day in Basti adar in September in the junior high school, Bali where the gram panchayat President Mr. Kaushalendra Singh, Mr. Yogesh Sing, Mr. Anil Kumar Yadav, Fr. Saji Paul, the school Principal, DISA staff members, Program in charge Sr. Shiji, Sr. Pratima, BCPM



Bahadarpur, Mr. Shiv Bhushan, block coordinator Mr. Rajender animators and young girls from nearby villages were present.

The girls must be given equal opportunities in the family to make sure their all-round development and progress. A family must be proud of its girl child as the constitution is trying to empower girls and women. Girls must be aware of their rights and fearlessly cooperate with the administration for better result, said Yogesh Singh.

The gram Panchayat head appreciated the efforts of DISA in giving proper direction and encouragement to the young girls. He hoped that the organization would continue with its good work and help the young girls to progress in their life and make their place in society. The young girls presented a cultural program and different literary sports and games competitions were also held and the winners were awarded.

10. World Literacy Day

World Literacy Day is observed on 8th December. DISA organized seminars and rallies throughout the month in Basti Sadar, Harraiya, Mithavel, and Ikauna to spread awareness among the masses. All these rallies were well attended by young girls and women in large numbers where the block coordinator and facilitators explained the importance of becoming literate. There is great importance for literacy in the life of an individual. In our country, the Literacy rate is very poor. Among five persons one man and two women are illiterate. Illiteracy is there even among children below fourteen years. A literate society is indispensable for the success and development of any nation.

Unless parents are educated they will never try to educate the children. If the children are educated they will fight against and eradicate the anti-social traditions of the village and society. If the children are uneducated they will bring more harm being unaware of what is happening in developed communities.

The first teacher of every child is its parent. Children are always inquisitive and if the parents have no enough knowledge, they cannot guide the children properly. Therefore it is important to be literate.

11. World Cleanliness Day

A seminar on cleanliness mission was organized on 13th June 2018 in the village Mahua by the block facilitator Priya Mishra. A good number of people turned out in the meeting. With the help of the





village head, Surendra Pandey, the village was divided into many parts and a map of the village prepared with the help of an expert. In this map all drainage systems of the village, brick laid lanes, and all government buildings and religious places were shown.

Women and men were asked to show the place on the map where they had gone for defecation. The places they had shown were marked. Then it was known that the whole village is surrounded by areas of defecation. Later Priya Mishra explained to the people the danger of this situation. At the end, all the people who attended the meeting stretched their hands and pledged that they will make and use toilets.



12. International HIV/AIDS Day

Seminar and awareness programme were organised in the month of December in DISA Branches Harraiya, Bastisadar, Ikuana and Mithavel. The members of Nai Disha Mahila Samiti, Saloni Sangam, Kissan Club and school children participated in it.

Chief Guest of the program, DISA coordinators and animators explained to the people about AIDS and its aftermath. AIDS day is observed by governmental, non-governmental organizations, civil society and health officers to make people aware of the seriousness of the diseases and protections and precautions to be taken to prevent it.

It is found that around 25 to 30 million people died between 1981-2007 across the world due to HIV infection. To prevent more deaths, it is important to make awareness among the public and for this purpose, we observe World AIDS Day. In developing countries like India, the threat is more severe and we have to be careful to protect our valuable life from this fatal disease.



13. World Disability Day

World Disability Day was celebrated at CRC, Gorakhpur on Monday, 3 December 2018 with all the 4 CBR partners of Gorakhpur. It was inaugurated with lighting the lamp by Mrs. Sangeeta Yadav, MLA, Chauri – Chaura. Mr. Rajkumar Singh, Deputy Director Disability empowerment



department, Gorakhpur gave the message that in discrimination and equality, provide education for each disable person.

Mr. K. Vijayendra Pandian IAS District Magistrate, Gorakhpur gave message that inclusive society, accessible place and education is very important for PwDs. Mrs. Sangeeta Yadav, Chief Guest in her message high- lighted that PwDs are part of the society so we cannot discriminate them.

On this occasion drawing competition was conducted for PwDs. 4 children (Shubham, Lav Kumar, Arjun, and Govind) participated in drawing competition from CBR program DISA, Sahjanwa. Fr. Benny Paul, Programme Director, DISA, Basti, 64 PwDs, their parents, CBR staff, and MSW students from Nirmala college, Thrissur participated from DISA. It was a great experience for the PwDs to come together.

14. Human Rights Day

International Human Rights Day was observed in the month of December worldwide. In association with this important event, seminars and awareness program were organized by DISA in Little Flower School Harraiya. The program was attended by the members from Nai Disha Mahila Samiti, Farmers club, DISA Kishori Group and students of the Little Flower School. Mr. Ajay Kumar, Advocate was the chief guest, besides Fr. Benny Paul, Director of DISA, Fr. Saji Paul, Principal of Little Flower School and Mrs. Munni Devi, chairperson of Nai Disha Mahila Samiti attended the program. Cultural programs and plays related to the occasion were presented by the village girls as well as the school children.

Similarly, a rally was organized by the students of St. Basil's School, Basti in Basti Sadar. Children raised slogans declaring human rights and seminar was held at the endpoint of the rally.

In Shravasti, the program was organized in primary school Kumhargarh as well as in the village Lodhpurwa. It was marked by a play, on slavery, depicting violation of human rights and atrocities on poor and helpless by the teenagers.

The people attended especially the women, young girls and children were made aware of their rights in the family, in the society and government administration. The Universal Human Rights declaration was made by the United Nations general assembly on December 10, 1948. In India also human rights are protected by the constitution of India which assures the right of every individual irrespective of religion, faith, caste or creed. These rights are protected by the law and can approach the concerned authorities in case of violation of Human Rights of any individual.





15. Republic Day

Republic Day celebrates the anniversary of the Constitution of India and the transition of India from a British Dominion to a republic on 26th January, 1950. It is celebrated with a great pride and enthusiasm throughout India. We the staff and members of Nai Disha Mahila Samati celebrated this day with due respect and enthusiasm. All our group members in Basti Sadar, Harraiya, Mithawal, Ikauna and Sahajanwa arranged the flag hoisting and colorful programs to make this day a memorable one. During the meetings awareness were given to the group members regarding Indian Constitution, Rights and duties of citizens etc...



16. International Women's Day

Under the guidance of DISA, International Women's Day was organized by Basti Sadar Nai Disha Mahila Samati at Surya Kumari Girls' Inter College, Nagar Bazar. The program was inaugurated with lighting of lamp by Chief Guest Mrs. Vimala Devi, Distinguished Guest Dr. Preeti Tripathi, DISA Program Director Father Benny Paul; Fr. Johny Mathew, Sr. Shiji and Chairperson of Nai Disha Mahila Samiti, Mrs. Chandrakala and many other dignitaries were present.



The International Women's Day was also organized at the DISA office by the Nai DISHA Mahila Samiti at Asnar, Mithawal block, Siddharthnagar and Ms. Kiran Shukla was the Chief Guest. The program was conducted by Kumai Sarita and Kumari Anju.



विभाजन की तलाश में स्थित भादसी जिले की तीनों तहसीलों बाढ़ आपदा के दौरान प्रभावित होती है। संसू गांव ऐसे हैं जो कई दिनों तक अलगाव रहते हैं। ऐसे समय में आपदा प्रभावित ग्रामीणों तक पहुंचाने व अन्य जीवन उपयोगी वस्तुएं पहुंचाना जरूरी होता है। प्रशासन की यह जिम्मेदारी भी होती है। आपदा से प्रभावित होने वाले गांवों के अलग-अलग बाढ़ चौकी

स्थापित की जाती हैं। यहां 24 पेट अधिकारी व कर्मचारी तैनात किए जाते हैं। बाढ़ चौकी के लिए सामान्य तौर पर ऐसे स्थल का चयन करना होता है, जहां बाढ़ का पानी न पहुंचे। इसके अलावा उस स्थान पर पंचजल आदि की व्यवस्था ठीक हो तथा भवन मजबूत हो।

तीनों वर्ष बाढ़ के दौरान विभिन्न व जयपुरा तहसील में पांच-पांच तथा इकोना तहसील में आठ बाढ़ चौकियां स्थापित की गईं थीं। डीएम टोपक मीना ने प्रत्येक बाढ़ चौकी का जायजा लेने के लिए एक-एक अधिकारी नामित किया है। यह अधिकारी बाढ़ चौकियों तक पहुंच कर उनकी स्थिति के बारे में बजायेंगे। ये जुलाई को बाढ़ आपदा की तैयारियों के लिए प्रशिक्षित बैठक में इसे अनिवार्य दिवा जाएंगे।
